



MODULE TITLE: EUROPEAN STUDIES: THE MAKING OF EUROPE

MODULE CODE: FMM731

MODULE SUMMARY:

This module requires you to explore and critically engage with the issue of Christianity and the Making of Europe, focusing primarily on the witness, influence and legacy of 'faithful minorities' in the development and growth of communities that lived and formulated theology on the margins of society and the institutional church. Key themes and content will include the paradox of Europe; the roots of our cultures and the current debate on Christian roots; the idea of 'Europe' in past and present and the mixed record of European Christianity. You will also explore and critically engage with such creative minorities from the Desert Fathers and monastic movements (e.g. Celtic and Benedictine); the Renaissance and Reformations (mainstream Protestant, Catholic, Radical), and with renewals and social reform, to synthesise key trajectories in the growth and decline of institutional Christianity in Europe, with critical evaluation of the place for a missional presence and expression in contemporary contexts in the light of the lessons learnt from history.

This module requires that you interact with a complex range of sources.
