MODULE SUMMARY:

In this module you will critically engage with a range of contemporary societal inequalities and injustices. In particular, in-depth consideration will be given to climate justice and environmental degradation, economic and social inequalities, racial division, and intergenerational and cultural conflicts, amongst other inter-related topics. A case study approach will be encouraged to assist you in developing critical, solutions-based approaches that seek to connect biblical and theological frameworks to the complexities of the issues under investigation. This will ensure that, firstly, you develop comprehensive and critical biblical and theological frameworks with which to evaluate contemporary issues, and, secondly, embed practical application in the form of missional approaches to just and ethical leadership, which will help to develop and sustain a more just and fair approach to Christian community life, both personally and corporately. You will be encouraged to engage with Education for Sustainable Development, and how that informs your thinking and application of learning to the module, and your studies more generally. This module also requires you to consider and evaluate postcolonial and decolonising perspectives including engagement with non-Western sources and viewpoints by academics and scholars from the global south.

READING STRATEGY:

Critical scholarly work in the field of justice studies and mission is an emergent field in terms of empirical research in practical theology. However, there are new pieces of doctoral level research in this field being undertaken and there are MA and Doctoral level theses available in repositories. Outside of mission studies there is much research related to a range of justice-based concepts, theories, and applications, and it is largely from this body of literature that you will engage in research in this new emergent field in empirical theological terms. You will be enabled to identify and interact with innovative research in theses and increasingly in journal articles as well as with good quality credible popular works written by Christian scholars, as well as with secular research literature.
